U.S. states, at sea, and abroad. This year, National Wreaths Across America day will be held on Saturday, December 14.





Bearcats wrap up stellar XC season

Honors keep coming for Brooklyn Biancamano. A speedy Long Beach High cross country and track star, Biancamano turned 16 in mid-November and just gets better with age. The Long Beach sophomore finished No. 1 among girls in 5A schools in the Mississippi High School Activities Association's 5K championship run.

The Lady Bearcats standout recorded an average mile time of 5:58 minutes. Biancamano's time was 18:33.2 for the race on November 4 at Choctaw Trails in Jackson. The talented Maroon & White student-athlete beat the second-place finisher by 59 seconds.

Last year, Biancamano won two Gatorade Player of the Year awards in Mississippi for cross country and track as a ninth grader at Long Beach High. The Harrison County resident was also awarded two Clarion-Ledger awards for both sports.

But it's obviously not all Biancamano on the fleet-footed Lady Bearcats cross country team. The Gulf Coast teen has awesome teammates. At the 5K race, teammate Abigail Osness finished in 12th place with an average mile time of 7:07.9. It took her a little more than 22 minutes to finish. Biancamano and "Gabby," an eighth grader, were both named to Mississippi's All-State Team.

Erin Biancamano, the Long Beach Lady Bearcats cross country coach, praises the entire squad. Long Beach girls were 5A Region 4 cross country champs this past season. That was achieved at October 24 competition hosted by George County High in Lucedale. The region includes East Central, Gautier, Hattiesburg, Pascagoula, Pearl River Central, Picayune and Long Beach. The Lady Bearcats finished an impressive 4th statewide at Choctaw Trails in early November.

The Long Beach boys cross country team shined as the 5A regional champ and ended the season 5th statewide at the Choctaw Trails finale. The course was a little muddy, but that didn't slow down the Bearcats.

Brooklyn's mom, Coach Biancamano, hands out superlatives to all the students on the two Long Beach cross country squads.

It helps to have an excellent

team's success each season. There were more than forty runners competing for the Maroon & White in 2019. Christopher Odom served as the boys coach.

At the regional, the leading Long Beach boys were sophomore Brandon Griffith, eighth grader Olin Doris and senior Carter Hudson. The fastest Long Beach boy at the statewide meet was Brandon Griffith with a final time of 18 minutes. 23 seconds.

"I am hopeful that many runners will return to continue their cross country journey," Biancamano said. "We had several promising young athletes on the team this year. Some are planning to try track in the spring."

In recent years, a man in Long Beach named Charles Wambolt read a Bible verse that spurred him to action. It read, "Pure religion and undefiled before God is this, to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction," James 1:27. Wambolt founded The Fatherless and Widows non-profit organization, which is in its seventh year as part of the Long Beach communi-

With a vision that includes awareness of the biblical importance of caring for fatherless and widows, as well as creating alliances to effectively care for their needs, the organization's motto also encourages honor for elders.

An extension of The Fatherless and Widows is God's Will Thrift Store, which opened last year next to the city post office on Klondyke Road. It was created with the purpose of helping support the vision and mission of The Fatherless and Widows

Statistics state one in four children under 18 currently live in a fatherless situation, creating a fifty percent poverty level, four times

the rate of father situations. Girls without a father figure are four times more likely to become pregnant under the age of fourteen. Psychiatric and behavior problems and suicide rates are increased. Boys are three times more likely to carry guns, traffic drugs, and display negative behavior. Widowhood is the fastest growing demographic in the world.

Wambolt states over one hundred Bible verses are written about fatherless and widows. The name and ministry

remained on his heart for over felt led to organize the ministry.

> feels led to foster this ministry, donating seventy-plus hours per week. Wambolt also mentions the contributions of Don Wambolt, **Brittany** Klause, Luke Hanna, Becky Ritch, Deb Cummings and Dennis Bogert to the ministry.

> Services provided by the organization for the fatherless include mentoring, educational classes, a running group, boating, fishing, kite flying, free bicycles and other special events. The organization has provided for six orphanages in five countries.





NCBC rates highly effective after participating in evaluation

Months of preparation paid off for the Naval Construction Battalion Center (NCBC), which earned an overall installation score of 89 percent for the Final Evaluation Problem (FEP) it participated in last month.

The FEP is designed to inspect the command, control, communications and Navy security departments and emergency operations response on all U.S. Navy installations. Installations are slated to undergo a FEP assessment once every three years.

The FEP is the final phase in a three-step evaluation process, which includes the command assessment of readiness and training (CART), regional assessment (RAS) and the final evaluation problem (FEP).

The FEP is essentially a rigorous three-day assessment that includes evaluating administration and record-keeping, the emergency operation center (EOC), and the capabilities of the security and fire departments onboard the installation. The assessment can involve situations such as recovering from natural disasters like tornados

or flooding, to handling improvised explosive devices or active-shooter training scenarios.


Clark, NCBC Gulfport security officer, noted the team effort that came into play to help make the FEP a success for NCBC.


"Everyone just worked together very well," said Clark. "The
