Long Beach Mardi Gras parade celebrates 60 yrs.

The season of Mardi Gras is near, and Long Beach is again getting decked out for the occasion. This year, Fat Tuesday will fall on February 25, but Long Beach will get an early start. The Long Beach Mardi Gras parade will be on Saturday, February 15, beginning at 6 p.m.

Mardi Gras is typically known as the time before Lent when Christians indulge in all the things they'll "give up" for Lent. Lent runs for forty days, not counting Sundays, after Ash Wednesday, and culminates in Easter Sunday. This year, Easter will fall on Sunday, April 12.

New Orleans is typically recog-

nized the center of Mardi Gras in the South, and that culture has spread to the Mississippi Gulf Coast. Every year, there are parades, parties and balls. The Long Beach Carnival Association will hold their Royal Coronation Ball the day before the parade, on Valentine's Day evening. The Carnival Association's website explains the Mardi Gras history as coming to the coast via Mobile Alabama.

Their website states, "Throughout the history of Europe, there is evidence of the celebration of Mardi Gras, which became permanently wedded to the three days preceding Ash Wednesday when Pope Gregory produced our pres-


LB baseball to host MSU **Coach Polk for fundraiser**

to the College World Series eight times.


Tickets to the event are \$30, and each ticket includes admission, dinner from Murky Waters and





ent calendar around 600 AD. On Mardi Gras Day, 1699, the French explorer Iberville camped near the mouth of the Mississippi River and named the site Point du Mardi Gras, and a few years later, the festival was later first celebrated in Mobile, Alabama in 1704."

This year's parade will mark the sixtieth anniversary of the Carnival Association of Long Beach.

In 1960, a small group of mothers whose children attended St. Thomas Elementary School recognized a need for a source of continuing funds to finance the betterment of the quality of education for their children, so they undertook the task of sponsoring an annual Carnival Ball to coincide with Mardi Gras Season. A contest was held to set a standard name for the King and Queen of Carnival, and Miss Mary Boggs submitted the names of Scott and Rosalie, because the Long Beach Community was first known as Scott's Station and Rosalie.

By 1964, the small club of ladies had generated so much interest that it had become a community affair, and the name was changed from the St. Thomas Mother's Club to Carnival Association of Long Beach. By 1979, the organization had spread coast-wide and became officially incorporated by obtaining chartered status as legitimate tax-exempt charitable organization.

This year's King Scott LX and Queen Rosalie 2020 are Jennifer Glen and Rik Dew.

The parade will begin around 6 p.m. and will start and end on Cleveland Avenue. The parade will run down 1st Street, Jeff Davis Avenue, and East Railroad.

Parade applications are available on the Carnival Association's website. Entrance fees received before January 31 are \$125. Applications received after that date will require an entrance fee of \$150.

All parade entries must build up the sides of their float so that people viewing the parade cannot reach into the float. On-board music is allowed, provided it is family-appropriate and does not exceed or overpower other floats' on-board music. Mobile units that are decorated to conform to the walking unit may accompany all walking units, but float entries are not allowed to have separate walking units.

The maximum height (including riders) allowed for a float is fourteen feet. The maximum length (including towing vehicle) is sixty-five feet. Any second level riders must have adequate railings around them to protect against falling.

Riders cannot hang out of the sides of the float or stand on the rails, and all floats must have adequate skirting around the bottom of the float.

A mandatory Captain's Meeting will be held on February 12 at 6 p.m. in the Long Beach High School parking lot for those participating in the parade. Floats will be in position on parade day no later than 4:30 p.m.





Shopping options expanded for some Veterans

One source of frustration for Sailors who separate before completing the minimum twenty years required to be categorized as a retiree has been the loss of access to the commissary, the Naval Exchange and Morale Welfare and Recreation events and services.

A new set of guidelines that was implemented January 1 gives veterans with a Department of Veterans Affairs (VA)-documented service-connected disability rating, Purple Heart recipients, former prisoners of war, and primary family caregivers for veterans enrolled in the VA's Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers new access to shop at military base commissaries, exchanges and enjoy certain Morale, Welfare, and Recreation (MWR) programs.

The new inclusive rules were laid out in the Purple Heart and Disabled Veterans Equal Access Act of 2018 and included in the John S. McCain National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2019.

"We look forward to welcoming our new expanded Navy family. It will be an honor to now have the opportunity to serve veterans who sacrificed and served this country," said Capt. Bill Whitmire, commanding officer of the Naval Construction Battalion Center.

The new access allows veterans to not only shop at the included base, but to participate in MWR events that help them acclimatize back into the Navy

base, but to participate in MWR events that help them acclimatize back into the Navy culture. These programs include movie theaters, car washes, arts and crafts centers, auto skills, vehicle storage, community recreation (outdoor recreation equipment rentals,

and tickets and travel), RV park rentals and Navy Gateway Inns & Suites (NGIS), Navy Getaways, and special events/entertainment where open to all rate categories. Unfortunately, the program does not apply to certain facilities and services like the fitness center or the child development center.

New base patrons can also take advantage of American-ForcesTravel.com, MWR's exclusive travel-booking website," Patrons can access the website at www.americanforcestravel.com/?refclickid=navyvetarticle.

Along with some MWR activity use, the benefit expansion includes commissary shopping privileges, as well

s military resale and Navy lodging. Lodging reservations can be made

at www.dod-lodging.net or 1-877-NAVY-BED. The new initiative is expected to extend eligibility to about 4.1 million new patrons, comprised

of nearly 1.5 million veterans who live within an hour of a military installation, of which 406,546 are U.S. Navy veterans.

To access DoD installations and obtain expanded privileges, veterans must present a Veteran Health Identification Card (VHIC) from VA that displays their eligibility category: "Purple Heart, former POW or service-connected." Caregivers must present an eligibility letter from the VA Office of

Community Care that indicates they are the primary family caregiver for an eligible veteran under the Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers and are eligible for these privileges, paired with an acceptable identification credential, such as a REAL ID-compliant driver's license or a U.S. passport. These credentials will need to be presented at MWR facilities and point-of-sale locations.

For more information about obtaining a VHIC or a letter from Veterans Affairs, visit a local VA medical facility or call 1-877-222-VETS (8387), Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. until 8 p.m., Eastern Standard Time.

"Veterans interested in services and facilities located on NCBC should stop by the Pass and ID office located at the Pass Road Gate complex," said Whitmire. "Exercising patience during this

"Exercising patience during this new expansion is paramount. The safety and security of our base and its population is our number one priority," said Ensign Will Clark, installation security officer. "We are dedicated to providing top-notch customer service to our veterans as they come to the base to process their base access."





LB Parks and Rec offers programs year round

The Long Beach Parks and Recreation department serves as a resource for Coast kids to stay active and get engaged in sports in their community. The department offers youth basketball, football, cheerleading, baseball and softball programs for both boys and girls spread throughout the year. Right now, the basketball season is in full swing and will continue through March.

The basketball season begins in early December and is open to any Long Beach kids ages 5 through 12. There are four levels that kids can play at: starter, rookie, minor, and major. The program continues through March, when baseball and softball season kicks off.

"After the basketball season ends, we go into the youth softball program on Daugherty Road and the youth baseball program at the Rec Center," said Bob Paul, head of the Parks and Rec department. The baseball program runs through the spring semester until the Long Beach schools let out.

Registration for the baseball and softball programs will open later this month or early in February, said Paul. The Parks and Rec department sends out flyers to the schools, and interested parents can sign up for their kids to begin the programs starting in March.

The Cal Ripken baseball program is open for tee ball all the way up through age 12. After that, there's a Babe Ruth program available for baseball players up to age 15. Softball ages range from tee ball up through age 16, depending on how many kids sign up.

After school is out and baseball wraps up, kids can still say active through the Parks and Rec Department's summer fitness program. Kids will play basketball and volleyball, play games, and watch movies, providing an option for parents looking for ways to keep their kids busy in the summer months.

In the fall, the Parks and Rec department offers football and cheerleading programs for Long Beach kids. These programs take place on a field over by the high

school, and registration will take place in the summer.

The Parks and Rec department also keeps the green spaces in Long Beach beautiful, as well as heads new park efforts. Last year, they worked hard to open a dog park which Long Beach residents will be able to enjoy in 2020. Local student shares the stage with Anna Nalick

Music students Elizabeth Burris and Savannah Ray are a little bit nervous.

But then, the star sitting next to them says she feels much the same.

"I'm so intimidated being on the stage with you two, because you're so good and so young," says award-winning songwriter Anna Nalick.

It is Sunday afternoon at the Trailhead Stage in Mandeville, Louisiana, and the 15-year-old Burris is onstage, performing her music before a crowd for the first time, and she is sharing the stage with the songwriting and singing star who has traveled from Los Angeles to help headline the Ozone Songwriter Festival this late-October weekend. Joining Burris onstage is 18-year-old Savannah Ray of Long Beach, also sharing her work with the festival-goers.

If the two young music students/ performers are starstruck or frightened, they are handling it well, singing and playing their instruments like old pros. Nalick works with Ray and Burris smoothly, as if the three have been perform-

ing together for years.

Nalick looks over the relaxed suburban crowd, the food vendors, and the dogs and kids playing in the grass near the outdoor stage.

"This is one of my favorite kind of shows," she quips, "because if you mess up, they'll still feed you later."

Both Burris and Ray, who have earned their spot on stage after years of hard work and study,

are also beneficiaries of the work done by the Ozone Music Education Foundation, the non-profit organization producing the songwriting festival with the help of many local sponsors. The foundation's goals are to further music

education, get musical instruments into the hands of children, support and develop songwriters,

and to boost the New Orleans and Northshore region's role as a music center.

In this second year of the Ozone Songwriter Festival, the foundation board's efforts have been rewarded by help from dozens of songwriters, including Nalick and television star and

country artist John Schneider, who have headlined the festival with Mark Mackay, Gary Baker, Frank Myers, C.J. Solar, Paul Childers, Foundation President Greg Barnhill and others.

A look at the background of the two young songwriters reveals exactly what the foundation is trying to support. Ray, who hails from Long Beach, Mississippi, and is a senior at Long Beach High School, has such a love for what she does that she jumped from playing the guitar and singing to writing music only one month later.

"I always loved to sing, but I was too shy," Ray said. "I finally asked for a guitar about two years ago. I started writing, and that's how I fell in love with it. This is how I share my feelings."

Of her early experiences stepping out onto the stage Ray says, "At first, you're a bit nervous, but then there's a connection that builds."

Ray's father, Gene Smith, decided that if his daughter began writing songs that quickly, then she had to be taken seriously. He helped her from age fifteen on, playing guitar and performing with her, and eventually moving the family to Nashville to develop her career. Later,

The R.O.C.K. Foundation is a non-profit on the Gulf Coast supporting children who often arrive at youth shelters with little or no possessions. Many are foster children with a great deal of uncertainty and fear regarding their new living situations. Some kids come with little more than the clothes they're wearing.

Reports from the Mississippi Department of Human Services show there were 5,243 children in state custody as of June 2018. That number includes 770 children from Harrison County and 250 from Hancock County.

Founded in 2007 by several friends, the foundation works closely with the Mississippi Department of Human Services, Child Protection Services, Court Appointed Special Advocates, the Harrison County Sheriff's Department and other law enforcement agencies. The organization's volunteers also partner with local schools, churches and other non-profits.

The R.O.C.K. Foundation is always seeking volunteers, says President Camille Peno. They can do such things as read to children, help with homework or mentor teens. People can also donate items – from new clothing to toys and furniture.

She even takes time to answer a few questions and talk about current projects.
