Long Beach High seniors vote for traditional graduation

The vote wasn't close at all. Nearly seventy-eight percent of Long Beach High seniors voted to have a traditional graduation ceremony.

That recent decision moves the graduation ceremonies for Long Beach Bearcats to June 26. There were 21.1 percent of the seniors wishing to go with a non-traditional ceremony on May 20.

The graduation event for Long Beach High remains booked for June 26 unless the COVID-19 crisis causes officials to go to a non-traditional ceremony. Officials will have another look at the date on June 15. If there is a change, students and parents will be contacted via email.

Among the vast majority voting

for a traditional graduation was Long Beach senior James McClure. He believes a "virtual" graduation just wouldn't be a good choice

just wouldn't be a good choice.

"It doesn't provide the same feeling of accomplishment as

a traditional graduation would," said Mc-Clure.

The seventeen-year-old resident wants his graduation to be a memorable experience before making plans to pursue a Navy career. He wants to be a pilot while studying aerospace engineering.

McClure will soon leave behind many lifelong friends once he gets his diploma in hand. With them, "I share some of the best memories of my life."

Road paving projects proceed in Long Beach

Motorists love driving along paved roads in their communities, and Long Beach is no exception.

A series of road re-paving projects began in February. The bulk of the work is done, officials say. At this stage, the last major project left is the paving of a Long Beach High parking lot. That work is expected to begin in June.

The blitz of projects costs \$1 million. A parking lot at Long Beach High "is the last phase in all this paving," says community affairs director Jenny Levens of the City of Long Beach.

Whether it is Mayor George Bass, people working in downtown businesses or parents playing with their children on Gulf Coast beaches, folks like to see paved roads in their communities.

For more than two months, work crews with Land Shapers labored on road jobs in Long Beach.

Roads like Jamaica Street, Windsor Place, Hanover Drive and North Lang

(from the railroad tracks to Old Pass Road) are among thirty-seven city road projects listed. From the Old Pass/Harris intersection to Catherine Street and Reinike Road, the list goes on. The bulk of the paving was accomplished during statewide shelter-inplace orders in the midst of the world's COVID-19 health emergency.

At this point in early May, an estimated \$915,000 of the \$1 million was spent so far on the projects on city streets, Levens said.

It was several years ago, City officials say, since so many Long Beach streets were paved.

For those wondering if there will be additional roads paved in the future, the answer is yes.

"We will pave more roads as funds come in," Leyens said. "We have a list that is in need of paving or repair," she added at City Hall offices along Jeff Davis Avenue.

Road work funds came from the Mississippi Legislature, she said.





Jeepin' the Coast postponed until July

Court reopens May 20, payments still due

The Long Beach Municipal Court has postponed several court sessions since March 19 due to the coronavirus threat. The Court will slowly begin to resume hearing cases on Wednesday, May 20, at 1 p.m.

In staying within the guidelines set by the State and local government, the following procedures will be implemented:

- Defendants will wear a mask that covers their mouth and nose while in the courtroom.
- Only people with immediate and direct business with the court will be allowed into the courtroom.
- In order to comply with social distancing and to maintain a six-foot distance between individuals, defendants will form a line outside the courtroom on north side of City Hall on marked spaces.
- Only those whose name appears on the docket, or those making a payment or filing a Petition Domestic Abuse Protective Order will be allowed to enter. Friends or family members will not be admitted into the courtroom.
- Anyone with any symptoms that may be related to COVID-19, such as a temperature of 100.4 or higher, experiencing a cough, shortness of

breath or sore throat, should contact the court for further instructions.

Even though the Court has been closed to the public, employees are still working and answering the telephone, and defendants are still responsible for making monthly payments.

Options to make payments include sending the payment by mail, using the drop box, paying online, or paying by phone.


To pay by mail, send a check or money order to Long Beach Municipal Court, P.O. Box 929, Long Beach, MS 39560. Mailed payments need to include the defendant's full name and date of birth.

To drop off payment, put the check or money order in an envelope marked "Court," then place it in the Water Department's drop box that is located in front of City Hall. Payments that are dropped off also need to include the defendant's full name and date of birth.

To pay by phone, call 877-793-7925. Defendants making online or phone payments will need to have their citation number and court date information.





At the same time, "I felt terrible


for these seniors, not just LBHS seniors, but all high school and college seniors that lost half of their last year in school," Nations said.

Her passion is her commitment to promoting public awareness of mental health problems impacting people in South Mississippi.

Cynthia Shields has an effective vehicle to advance her mission. The Long Beach resident serves as president of the Coastal Mississippi chapter of the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI).

The group supports mental health needs of families in Jackson, Hancock, Harrison, Pearl River, Stone and George counties.

NAMI officials are stepping up their activities, since May is Mental Health Awareness Month across the United

"The local chapter is our catalyst," Shields says.

NAMI leaders like her are sponsoring a National Day of Hope on May 30. A kickoff to a NAMIWalks fundraiser on the Gulf Coast October 3, the Day of Hope is a virtual celebration, with leaders inviting people to join them.

The nation's largest grassroots mental health organization promotes being healthy physically, mentally and spiritually. It's a cause worth showcasing. NAMI officials say one in every four individuals across America has a mental health condition of some type.

Shields is spreading the word about

the COVID-19 crisis. By early May, more than 33 million Amersuddenly icans lost their jobs. There were more than 1.29 million coronavirus cases across the U.S. and over 76,512 deaths as of May 7.

As a result of the health emergency, **NAMI** members in the



Marine Recreational Information Program (MRIP) Workshop planned

The Standing, Reef Fish, Mackerel, Ecosystem, and Socioeconomic Scientific and Statistical Committees will meet to discuss the MRIP Fishing Effort Survey and its calibration to historical Effort Survey. The Committees will also discuss the calibration process, including models and methods, comparison to historical data, and impacts of calibration on regional estimates of fishing effort. The weight estimation procedures will also be addressed,



catch and effort data. This meeting, originally planned for April 14-15, 2020, was rescheduled due to concerns about COVID-19 virus and travel restrictions. The workshop will convene from 8:30 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. on Wednesday, July 8, and Thursday, July 9, 2020 at the Renaissance Tampa International Plaza Hotel, located at 4200 Jim Walter Blvd., Tampa, FL 33607.

The workshop will begin on July 8 with a presentation and discussion of the differences in effort survey design, catch and effort estimation, characterization of biases, and quality control measures for the new MRIP Fishing

On July 9, the Committees will consider case studies for Gulf of Mexico migratory group King Mackerel and Gray Snapper. A comparison of landings, effort, and discards, pre and post-Fishing Effort Survey as well as treatment of shore mode landings, effort and discards will be presented for both stocks. The Committees are expected to review this information, discuss it, and provide any recommendations to the Council. This workshop is open to the public.



CES USES MAKERSPACE TO BENEFIT MEDICAL WORKERS

Joining the nationwide efforts to produce personal protective equipment (PPE) for healthcare workers, Will Ashley, Makerspace Coordinator at Coast Episcopal School (CES) in Long Beach, has been manufacturing 3D face shields and face mask extenders. The extenders make face masks more comfortable to wear by lessening the strain on the ears from wearing a mask for extended periods of time.

"One of my goals for the Makerspace is to show our students how we might use technology to solve everyday problems," said Ashley. "A major problem in the news lately is that our hospitals lack PPE to adequately deal with the

COVID-19 pandemic. For the last two weeks, the Makerspace at CES has been printing face shields in our 3D printers for the medical professionals in our area. Each face shield takes about two hours to print. We have printed over seventy face shields and will soon be delivering them to the medical heroes who need them at this time."

Volunteers from CES got together to assemble and package the final product and make their first delivery to the staff at Memorial Hospital in Gulfport.

CES officials said that Budmen Industries provided the design of the face shield so anyone who is able could begin producing them for their local communities. Quinn Callander, a twelve-year-old Boy Scout from British Columbia, Canada, provided the modified design of the face mask extender.

USM to distribute CARES funding, readies for fall


The University of Southern Mississippi has finalized the process for distributing \$6,753,021 in CARES Act funding designated for Emergency Financial Aid Grants for students.

Students who believe they are eligible to receive CARES emergency funds must complete an online application to certify that they have incurred qualifying expenses related to the disruption of campus operations due to COVID-19, in accordance with United States Department of Education guidelines.

Although institutions have been given a one-year time frame to distribute all funds, USM's goal is to distribute CARES Act funds as soon as possible.

Students must meet eligibility requirements determined by the United States Department of Education and have a 2019-2020 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) on file to confirm eligibility for CARES emergency funds.

Specific eligibility requirements and FAFSA filing instructions have been sent

to students via email.

USM is planning to resume on-campus operations this fall, with the semester scheduled to begin August 24. These plans could change, as guidance from public health officials monitoring COVID-19 continues to evolve.

In preparation for this transition, modified policies and procedures are being developed for implementation across the institution, including expanded health and safety protocols and flexible course formats, which will allow the institution to adapt more easily to changes in the environment.

The university's academic leaders are reviewing national best practices to guide the institution in the transition to an on-campus fall semester, and university officials say faculty are well prepared to adapt to a variety of course delivery

formats as this public health situation evolves further. All spring classes are currently being delivered remotely, and online or other remote delivery formats are also planned for summer courses.

Public health guidelines will determine future plans for large gatherings, including athletic events. Changes to student life programming and housing policies will also be implemented in accordance with current health guidance.

The deadline for proposals to be submitted is 5 p.m. on June 30, 2020. Proposals may be submitted to Russell Weatherly at GOMESA@ dmr.ms.gov.


As I promote the census across the state, I continue to hear a number of fears and misconceptions

egarding the process. Mississippians should know a legitimate census form or census taker will never ask for your social security number, banking information, donations, or anything on behalf of a political party. I've also heard concerns about confidentiality. Not only are you anonymous, please

know your data is used for statistical purposes only, and your responses cannot be shared for a minimum of seventy years.

Similar to an election, the census can only accurately serve those who participate. In 2000, our state lost a congressional seat (MS-5) due to low census participation. Since then, we only send four Representatives to Washington each term, resulting in one less person to speak for Mississippi. In the 2010 census, more than 265,000 Mississippians went uncounted. If this happens again, we could lose billions of dollars in federal funding for our state. Simply put: the more accurate Mississippi's count, the more financial resources and representation Mississippians will receive, thus positively impacting your community and your household for the next decade.

Due to the COVID-19 outbreak, grassroots efforts to ensure an accurate census count are now on hold. As I write this, we are currently one of the top ten states in terms of the percentage of voluntary responses. I am calling on you to keep up the good work and help ensure a complete and accurate count for Mississippi. Encourage your friends, family members, and neighbors to participate in this vital process, and don't forget to reach out to those around you who may need help submitting responses. The census is more than just a head count; it's an opportunity to move Mississippi forward.

Residents encouraged to plan for hurricane season

The Mississippi Department of Transportation (MDOT) joins the Mississippi Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) is advising residents to prepare for hurricane season, which officially begins June 1 and runs through November.

"Don't wait until hurricane season to prepare; start now," said Commissioner Tom King, Southern Transportation District. "An above average hurricane season is predicted for this year. Before any tropical weather forms, residents should have an evacuation plan in place."

To help residents plan evacuations, MDOT provides free travel resources, including hurricane evacuation maps in English, Spanish or Vietnamese, and the MDOT Traffic mobile app.

The hurricane evacuation maps will be distributed through newspapers in south Mississippi the first week of June. Additional copies of the maps will be mailed to numerous city halls, libraries and other community centers in south Mississippi for distribution. Orders can also be placed online at GoMDOT. com/maps.

Residents are also encouraged

to download the MDOT Traffic mobile app. The app provides real-time traffic conditions throughout the state and will be utilized to publish emergency alerts directly to users.

"The resources are there to ensure you keep yourself and loved ones safe when a tropical system threatens," said King. "It's up to you to create an evacuation plan before the storm and stay prepared during hurricane season."

This year, residents are advised to take extra precautions because of coronavirus (COVID-19). Residents should consider additional supplies that may be needed to protect themselves and their families, including purchasing Personal Protection Equipment (PPE) like masks, hand sanitizer and disinfectants and adding them to a "Go Bag" in case an evacuation is needed.

Go Bag contents should also include the following:

- o Cash: If the power goes out, credit cards won't work. Keep cash on hand for replenishing supplies.
- o Medications: Pharmacies might be closed, and hospitals could be overwhelmed. Pack any necessary medications and assume there will not be access to refills for

several days

- o A battery-powered radio: If electricity is out and cell towers are down, this is the best way to know what's happening.
 o A gallon of water for every
- o A gallon of water for every family member and pet: Widespread power outages could make tap water unsafe to drink.
- o Important documents: Social Security cards, passports, birth certificates, driver's licenses and more could all be lost or destroyed in a flood, wildfire or any natural disaster. Keep copies of these documents in a waterproof container or digital image saved online. Include a copy of insurance policies so a claim can be filed quickly once the danger has passed.

"As we continue to social distance because of COVID-19, consider where you would go if you had to evacuate because of a storm," said Insurance Commissioner Mike Chaney. "Mississippi storm shelters are practicing social distancing. Find out where you could safely go, what you would need to bring with you, and create a communication plan with your family so everyone understands what to do."

Evacuations are more common than people realize. Residents should make themselves familiar with their community's evacuation zones, so they will know exactly where to go. If a hurricane threatens the community and local officials say it's time to evacuate, don't hesitate; go early.

Residents should review their insurance coverage and make sure they are familiar with their policies. For questions, contact an insurance agent or insurer.

Flood damage is generally not covered by a standard homeowners or renter's insurance policy. Those don't have flood insurance and are considering purchasing a policy should remember there is a 30-day waiting period for policies bought through the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). Those who purchase a private flood policy should ask about the waiting period
